

## **New Student Services Centre Opened**

The new CFBC Student Services Centre was officially opened by the Minister of Education, Honorable Jonel Powell during his visit to the main campus on September 27, 2021 for an official tour of the college's campuses. The new space houses a collection of facilities, services, and staff toward the purpose of bolstering our student support services and creating a vibrant campus community. Although an initial design for student spaces was presented in 2018, it was not until now that the functional space became a reality. The advent of the COVID-19 pandemic exacerbated challenges for students who were seeking study spaces with the introduction of hybrid classes at CFBC.

Some students found it challenging to transition from online and face-to-face classes, as sometimes there was limited time to transition from one to the other and spaces in the library became occupied quickly. The final design of the space today was birthed from this need. It features carrells with charging ports for independent study, soft-seating for quiet collaborative work and cubicles for student services staff .

We will continue to provide services, activities, programming, and facilities that complement the mission of the CFBC, by building community and engagement across all stakeholders. The student services staff provide support and recommend resources related to academic, emotional, and social challenges. CFBC students will welcome the cool and comfortable air-conditioned environment. Undoubtedly, this space will become a critical point for collegiate life for CFBC students, but also faculty, staff, alumni, and guests.











## **Summary of Orientation Activities**

Orientation activities were held from August 13-3, 2021. The first activities of the new Student Orientation were the Career Guidance sessions hosted via Zoom, which were facilitated by Dr. Hughon James, Counsellor. The aim of those sessions was to guide students through their academic choices at CFBC and to chart a pathway toward their career. Both sessions were well attended, with more than 150 students at each session.

Orientation can be a very confusing time for new students. They are being provided with a surplus of information in a short amount of time and the learning curve is steep, so methods were employed to break the information down into manageable chunks. CFBC's YouTube platform "CFBCTV" was utilised to host short videos that helped students to learn more about various topics that are critical to navigating CFBC. The topics included were Registration, Finance, Student Services, COVID-19 Protocols, Rules & Security. To ensure that there was an opportunity for any remaining questions to be answered, a live Zoom Q&A session was hosted, with up to 204 persons in attendance.

Convocation is the official welcome of our new students to CFBC and was held on September 9, 2021, via Zoom and was hosted by SGA President, Mr. Curje Stevens. It featured speeches by the Minister of Education, the Deputy Chair of the CFBC Board of Governors, College President and the keynote speaker Pastor Renicia Huggins. Over 200 persons joined in the virtual event.

For the new academic year, the Student Services Department has initiated an idea that is intended to support students based on the feedback that we have received from students and faculty and staff regarding students' abilities. "If you can't run, then walk. If you can't walk, then crawl. While in primary school, learning seemed like a mammoth task and an impossible responsibility. However, when Mr. Browne entered Junior High School in the lowest form, he was ready to prove to others that he was not incapable of academic success.
